However, the demise of Carillion and the difficulties of other companies are concentrating attention on selective bidding and advancing added value through technology."

Outsourced services enjoy considerable protection from economic fluctuations. They tend to benefit both from an increased customer cost-cutting focus during economic slowdowns, and from contract expansion in economic upturns. Consequently, the uncertainties created by Brexit for many industrial and commercial sectors are not as significant in the market. However, the soft service sector of the industry tends to be a heavy uses of labour, which is adding pressure to industry margins through increased costs associated with the National Living Wage, the introduction of the Apprenticeship Levy, and the costs associated with workplace pensions. These pressures are adding to a highly competitive market, which saw a major casualty in 2018 in Carillion, and profit warnings from another major provider, Capita. Market leaders are increasingly investing in technology; not only to reduce reliance on manpower, but to offer added value to clients by providing richer information on which property and facilities management decisions can be made.
